

STUDENT WELLBEING AND ENGAGEMENT POLICY

PURPOSE

The purpose of this policy is to ensure that all students and members of our school community understand:

- (a) our commitment to providing a safe and supportive learning environment for students
- (b) expectations for positive student behaviour
- (c) support available to students and families
- (d) our school's policies and procedures for responding to inappropriate student behaviour.

Kyneton Primary School is committed to providing a safe, secure and stimulating learning environment for all students. We understand that students reach their full potential only when they are happy, healthy and safe, and that a positive school culture, where student participation is encouraged and valued, helps to engage students and support them in their learning. Our school acknowledges that student wellbeing and student learning outcomes are closely linked.

The objective of this policy is to support our school to create and maintain a safe, supportive and inclusive school environment consistent with our school's values.

SCOPE

This policy applies to all school activities, including camps and excursions.

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POLICY

1. School profile

Kyneton Primary School has an enrolment of approximately 350 students. We have a regular prep enrolment of about approximately 50 students each year. The school is situated in Kyneton a town of approximately 8000 people and an hour's drive northeast of Melbourne. Kyneton Primary School is situated in the town's education precinct and has been a major part of Kyneton since 1856. The large majority of our Year 6 students go on to schooling at Kyneton High School. We are a family friendly school and strongly encourage parents to become involved in assisting in the classrooms, or with school programs and activities. At the start of Term 2 2018 we relocated to a new school in Edgecombe Street. The new Kyneton Primary School has been hailed as a "benchmark for educational design". The school has embraced 21st century learning and ventured beyond the traditional classroom. The layout is flexible, sustainable and allows educators to perform at the cutting edge of teaching and learning. The result is a design that embraces technology but treats every space within the school and its grounds as a place to learn. The learning environments encourage students to become independent and creative with spaces that accommodate small or large groups so children can work according to their needs and abilities. Our Whole School Review in 2019 commended the school on its positive working tone with a sense of calm across the school. School Council is responsible for school policy and resources within the school. School uniform is compulsory and includes a Sun Smart hat which must be worn in Terms 1 and 4. A canteen operates four days a week with external lunch provision one day a week. Our school uses the Restorative Practices Model of Behaviour Management and is guided by our Strategic Plan which aims to continue to improve and maximize student outcomes, to improve student engagement and motivation in their learning and to develop students who are resilient learners.

2. School values, philosophy and vision

Our vision: Our school will develop and inspire a community of inclusive, lifelong learners.

Our School Values are caring, respect, persistence, pride, responsibility and excellence. Students, staff and members of our school community are encouraged to live and demonstrate our core values at every opportunity.

Our mission: We instruct, challenge and transform by implementing the following Teaching and Learning Framework

- Setting high expectations for every student.
- Developing safe, supportive and inclusive learning environments.
- Empowering Learners and leaders through student voice and inclusive interactions.
- Using coherent and contextually relevant instructional practices and assessment strategies.
- Providing deep learning challenges for students to construct and apply new knowledge.
- Utilising multiple forms of assessment and feedback to inform teaching and learning practices.
- Implementing evidence-based strategies to drive professional practice improvement.
- Empowering students to recognise themselves as global citizens.
- Recognising the role of parents and carers as first educators and engaging them in school learning programs.

Our whole school behaviour expectations are DO YOUR BEST – RESPECT YOUR HOME AND SCHOOL – HELP OTHERS SUCCEED.



The effort and achievements of students who model our school values are formally celebrated at school assemblies and in the school newsletter.

3. Wellbeing and engagement strategies

Kyneton Primary School has developed a range of strategies to promote engagement, an inclusive and safe environment, positive behaviour, and respectful relationships for all students in our school. We recognise the importance of student friendships and peer support in helping children and students feel safe and less isolated. We acknowledge that some students may need extra social, emotional or educational support at school, and that the needs of students will change over time as they grow and learn.

A summary of the universal (whole of school), targeted (year group specific) and individual engagement strategies used by our school is included below:

<u>Universal</u>

- high and consistent expectations of all staff, students and parents and carers
- prioritise positive relationships between staff and students, recognising the fundamental role this plays in building and sustaining student wellbeing
- creating a culture that is inclusive, engaging and supportive and that embraces and celebrates diversity and empowers all students to participate and feel valued
- creating classroom codes of conduct and behaviour agreements that reinforce the school wide expectations
- welcoming all parents/carers and being responsive to them as partners in learning
- analysing and being responsive to a range of school data such as attendance, Attitudes to School Survey, parent survey data, student management data and school level assessment data
- teachers at Kyneton Primary School use an instructional framework to ensure an explicit, common and shared model of instruction to ensure that evidenced-based, high yield teaching practices are incorporated into all lessons
- teachers at Kyneton Primary School adopt a broad range of teaching and assessment approaches to effectively respond to the diverse learning styles, strengths and needs of our students and follow the standards set by the Victorian Institute of Teaching
- our school's Statement of Values and School Philosophy are incorporated into our curriculum and promoted to students, staff and parents so that they are shared and celebrated as the foundation of our school community
- carefully planned transition programs to support students moving into different stages of their schooling
- positive behaviour and student achievement is acknowledged in the classroom, and formally in school assemblies and communication to parents
- monitor student attendance and implement attendance improvement strategies at a wholeschool, cohort and individual level
- students have the opportunity to contribute to and provide feedback on decisions about school operations through the Student Representative Council and other forums including the Gardening and Sustainability group. Students are also encouraged to speak with their teachers, Assistant Principal and Principal whenever they have any questions or concerns.
- opportunities exist for cross—age connections amongst students through school plays, athletics, music programs and peer support programs



- we engage in school wide positive behaviour support with our staff and students, which includes programs such as:
 - Respectful Relationships
 - The Berry Street Education Model
 - Restorative Practices
- programs, incursions and excursions developed to address issue specific needs or behaviour
- opportunities for student inclusion (i.e. sports teams, clubs, recess and lunchtime activities)
- buddy programs (PLAY and Prep/6 buddies)
- measures are in place to empower our school community to identify, report and address inappropriate and harmful behaviours such as racism, homophobia and other forms of discrimination or harassment.
- Kyneton Primary School is a Dogs Connect school we have a wellbeing dog and senior students assist with her on a voluntary basis.

Targeted

- Koorie students are supported to engage fully in their education, in a positive learning environment that understands and appreciates the strength of Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander culture
- our English as a second language students are supported and all cultural and linguistically diverse students are supported to feel safe and included in our school
- we provide a positive and respectful learning environment for our students who identify as LGBTIQ+ and follow the Department's policy on <u>LGBTIQ Student Support</u>]
- all students in Out of Home Care are supported in accordance with the Department's policy on <u>Supporting Students in Out-of-Home Care</u> including being appointed a Learning Mentor, having an Individual Learning Plan and a Student Support Group (SSG) and being referred to Student Support Services for an Educational Needs Assessment
- students with a disability are supported to be able to engage fully in their learning and school
 activities in accordance with the Department's policy on <u>Students with Disability</u>, such as
 through reasonable adjustments to support access to learning programs, consultation with
 families and where required, student support groups and individual education plans
- Kyneton Primary School employs a part time Disability Inclusion teacher and mental health and wellbeing teacher
- wellbeing and health staff will undertake health promotion and social skills development in response to needs identified by student wellbeing data, classroom teachers or other school staff each year
- staff will apply a trauma-informed approach (Berry Street Education Model) to working with students who have experienced trauma



<u>Individual</u>

Kyneton Primary school implements a range of strategies that support and promote individual support and engagement. These can include:

- <u>Student Support Groups</u>
- Individual Education Plans
- Behaviour Support Plans
- <u>Student Support Services</u>

as well as referrals to other Department programs and services such as:

- Program for Students with Disabilities
- Mental health toolkit
- <u>headspace</u>
- Navigator
- <u>LOOKOUT</u>
- building constructive relationships with students at risk or students who are vulnerable due to complex individual circumstances
- meeting with student and their parent/carer to talk about how best to help the student engage with school <u>Student Support Groups</u>
- developing an Individual Learning Plan and/or a Behaviour Support Plan
- considering if any environmental changes need to be made, for example changing the classroom set up
- referring the student to:
 - school-based wellbeing supports
 - Student Support Services
 - Appropriate external supports such as council-based youth and family services, other allied health professionals, headspace, child and adolescent mental health services or ChildFirst/Orange Door
 - Re-engagement programs such as Navigator (12 years and older)

Where necessary the school will support the student's family to engage by:

- being responsive and sensitive to changes in the student's circumstances and health and wellbeing
- collaborating, where appropriate and with the support of the student and their family, with any external allied health professionals, services or agencies that are supporting the student
- monitoring individual student attendance and developing an Attendance Improvement Plans in collaboration with the student and their family
- arranging State Schools Relief support
- engaging with our regional Koorie Engagement Support Officers
- running regular Student Support Group meetings for all students:
 - \circ with a disability
 - $\circ \quad \text{in Out of Home Care} \\$
 - with other complex needs that require ongoing support and monitoring.



4. Identifying students in need of support

Kyneton Primary School is committed to providing the necessary support to ensure our students are supported intellectually, emotionally and socially. The student Mental Health and Wellbeing team plays a significant role in developing and implementing strategies to help identify students in need of support and enhance student wellbeing. Kyneton Primary School will utilise the following information and tools to identify students in need of extra emotional, social or educational support:

- personal, health and learning information gathered upon enrolment and while the student is enrolled
- attendance records
- academic performance
- observations by school staff such as changes in engagement, behaviour, self-care, social connectedness and motivation
- attendance, detention and suspension data
- engagement with families
- self-referrals or referrals from peers
- Compass Chronicle data

5. Student rights and responsibilities

All members of our school community have a right to experience a safe and supportive school environment. We expect that all students, staff, parents and carers treat each other with respect and dignity. Our school's Statement of Values highlights the rights and responsibilities of members of our community.

Students have the right to:

- participate fully in their education
- feel safe, secure and happy at school
- learn in an environment free from bullying, harassment, violence, racism, discrimination or intimidation
- express their ideas, feelings and concerns.

Students have the responsibility to:

- participate fully in their educational program
- display positive behaviours that demonstrate respect for themselves, their peers, their teachers and members of the school community
- respect the right of others to learn.

Students who may have a complaint or concern about something that has happened at school are encouraged to speak to their parents or carers and approach a trusted teacher or a member of the school leadership team. Further information about raising a complaint or concern is available in our Complaints Policy.



6. Student behavioural expectations and management

Behavioural expectations of students are grounded in our school's Statement of Values/Student code of conduct.

Violence, bullying, and other offensive and harmful behaviours such as racism, harassment and discrimination will not be tolerated and will be managed in accordance with this policy.

When a student acts in breach of the behaviour standards of our school community, Kyneton Primary School will institute a staged response, consistent with the Department's policies on behaviour, discipline and student wellbeing and engagement. Where appropriate, parents will be informed about the inappropriate behaviour and the disciplinary action taken by teachers and other school staff.

Our school considers, explores and implements positive and non-punitive interventions to support student behaviour before considering disciplinary measures such as detention, withdrawal of privileges or withdrawal from class.

Disciplinary measures may be used as part of a staged response to inappropriate behaviour in combination with other engagement and support strategies to ensure that factors that may have contributed to the student's behaviour are identified and addressed. Disciplinary measures at our school will be applied fairly and consistently. Students will always be provided with an opportunity to be heard.

Disciplinary measures that may be applied include:

- warning a student that their behaviour is inappropriate
- teacher controlled consequences such as moving a student in a classroom or other reasonable and proportionate responses to misbehaviour
- withdrawal of privileges
- referral to the Assistant principal or Principal
- restorative practices
- detentions
- behaviour support and intervention meetings
- suspension
- expulsion

Suspension, expulsion and restrictive interventions are measures of last resort and may only be used in situations consistent with Department policy, available at:

In line with Ministerial Order 1125, no student aged 8 or younger will be expelled without the approval of the Secretary of the Department of Education and Training.

The Principal of Kyneton Primary School is responsible for ensuring all suspensions and expulsions are recorded on CASES21.

Corporal punishment is prohibited by law and will not be used in any circumstance at our school.



7. Engaging with families

Kyneton Primary School values the input of parents and carers, and we will strive to support families to engage in their child's learning and build their capacity as active learners. We aim to be partners in learning with parents and carers in our school community.

We work hard to create successful partnerships with parents and carers by:

- ensuring that all parents have access to our school policies and procedures, available on our school website
- maintaining an open, respectful line of communication between parents and staff, supported by our Communicating with School Staff policy.
- providing parent volunteer opportunities so that families can contribute to school activities
- involving families with homework where applicable and other curriculum-related activities
- involving families in school decision making
- coordinating resources and services from the community for families
- including families in Student Support Groups and developing individual plans for students.
- 8. Evaluation

Kyneton Primary School will collect data each year to understand the frequency and types of wellbeing issues that are experienced by our students so that we can measure the success or otherwise of our school-based strategies and identify emerging trends or needs.

Sources of data that will be assessed on an annual basis include:

- student survey data
- incidents data
- school reports
- parent survey
- case management
- CASES21, including attendance and absence data
- SOCS

Kyneton Primary School will also regularly monitor available data dashboards to ensure any wellbeing or engagement issues are acted upon in a timely manner and any intervention occurs as soon as possible.
